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Walking in a garden city



Eniwa is known as a city of flowers with more citizens engaging in gardening than in many other cities in Hokkaido. Enjoy a garden tour while learning about how local gardeners try to protect the beautiful scenery.

Aspiring to create a city of flowers that children can feel proud of

Characterized by beautiful streetscape full of flowers, the Megumino area in Eniwa is the envy of gardeners across Japan. Many home owners in the area open their gardens, and enjoy interacting with visitors. In this new town, sales of land lots started in 1980, and a decade later a Flower and Daily Living Exhibition was held for the promotion of gardening in the community. At the exhibition, a gardening expert advised city officials that they should develop Eniwa, meaning a garden city in English, by following in the footsteps of New Zealand's Christchurch, a world-famous garden city. In the following year, 13 citizens made an inspection tour to Christchurch.

Mayumi Uchikura has lived in the Megumino area since 1989. When she watched slides from the inspection tour, she felt strongly that she wanted to make Megumino full of flowers like Christchurch and make Eniwa a city children could feel proud of. She helped launch a garden contest in which residents competed over the beauty of their gardens

Mayumi stresses that although numerous beautiful private gardens can be found across Japan, there is no municipality like Eniwa in which the streets are full of flowers. In fact, Eniwa was developed into a city of flowers under the initiative of not the government but local residents. Schools, communities and trade associations have come to work together in beautifying the city by weeding and planting flower seedlings in parks and along the streets.

Between late June and mid-August, when garden flowers in Eniwa are at their best, many people from across Japan and beyond visit the city. Mayumi expresses her hope that since Megumino is a residential area, not a tourist spot, visitors will follow proper etiquette so that both residents and visitors can continue to enjoy interacting with one another. Mayumi and other Eniwa citizens look forward to seeing lots of visitors in flower seasons.



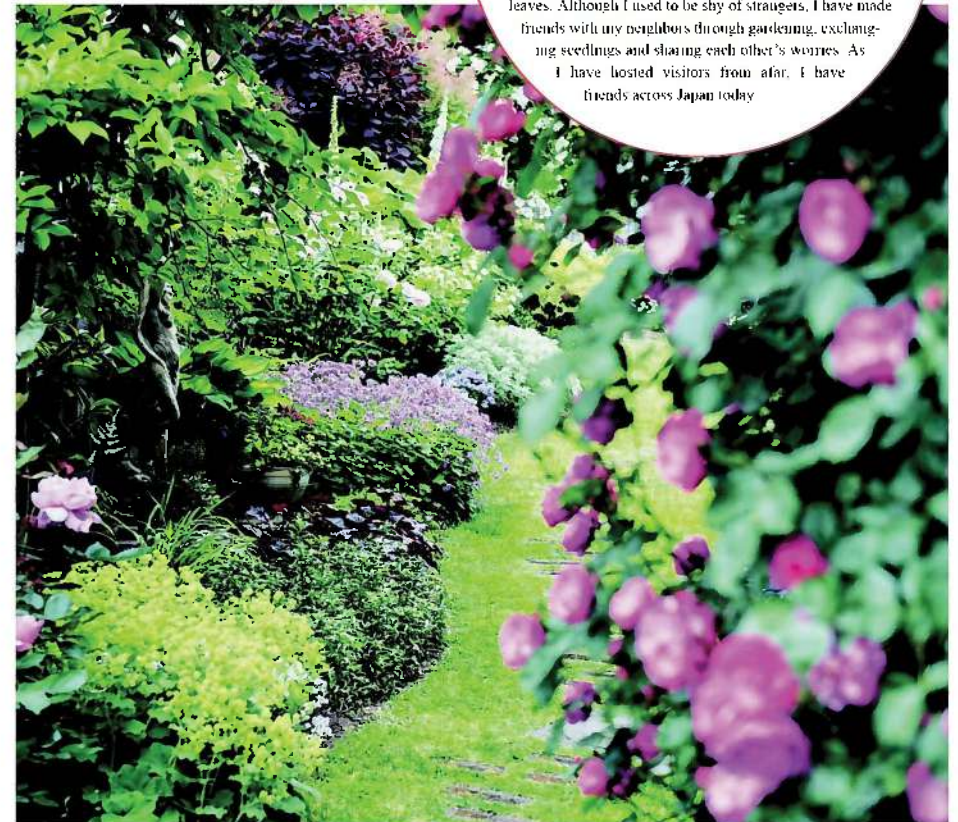
Garden Tour Do's and Don'ts

- Do not speak loudly as it will disturb neighbors
- Do not allow buses to enter residential streets
- When parking on the street, turn off the engine and don't obstruct the passage of other vehicles
- Don't ring the doorbell
- As a general rule, you should see gardens from outside the premises. Don't enter the garden without the approval of its owner
- Don't wear heels when you enter a garden.
- Don't touch or tread on flowers, break stems or take home seeds
- Asking for roots and cuttings is a no-no
- Do say hello to the owner of the garden and express your appreciation.

Ikoji Flower Garden

It all began with an initiative to plant flowers on wasteland

There is an episode befitting a city of gardening. The Ikoji Flower Garden in the Hana Road Eniwa roadside rest area was originally developed in a residential area in the Megunino Minami area. Covering an area of a little over 2,300 square meters, the original location of the flower garden had been a site designated for a municipal day care center, but it had been left unattended for more than 25 years. It was local residents who acted because they could no longer stand having such unattended land in their neighborhood.

Chikako Ikenaga, who has taken on a leadership role since the beginning, explained how she and other residents began collecting waste materials to raise funds to buy flower seedlings for the land because having unattended land so close to a national highway was more than they could tolerate as citizens of a would-be city of beautiful flowers. Although the city government initially insisted that they

could lend no city land to individuals or corporations, the Hana Ippai (Full of Flowers) Cultural Association intervened and made it possible for the residents to borrow the land.

In 2004, 50 people joined in the effort to turn the barren patch of land into a flower garden. Four years later, when the flower garden was relocated to the current location due to the city government's decision to sell the land for housing, as many as 160 people joined in the relocation effort. Volunteers, who frequently visit to tend the garden, express their love of gradual changes in the flowering period and explain how they enjoy chatting with visitors and seeing them impressed by the colors of the plants that are more vivid than in the mainland of Japan despite being the same varieties of flowers. The "flower story" that began with local residents who planted flowers on barren land will continue to evolve.

June Eniwa Flower and Daily Living Exhibition and Its Eniwa Marché

The Eniwa Flower and Daily Living Exhibition is held on the last weekend of every June at the main venue of the Hana Road Eniwa roadside rest area. Events held during the exhibition include a flower pot competition, a flower market (in all you can pack vegetables event), and a tour to open gardens in the city.



October Eniwa Happy Halloween

A Halloween event, including a costume contest and a live concert, is held every year on around October 20 at the Hana Road Eniwa roadside rest area. In 2016, the organizer of the event got a Guinness World Record by displaying 2,015,366 3-tonnets made by carving pumpkins.



February Eniwa Scenic Night

This annual candle event is held in early February at 19 venues across Eniwa, including the Hana Road Eniwa roadside rest area. The city is decorated with approximately 15,000 ice lanterns and snow lanterns. The roadside rest area offers a hands-on lantern-making program.



Michi-to-Kawa-no-Eki Hana Road Eniwa

This roadside rest area showcases the appeal of Eniwa and includes facilities such as the Ikoji Flower Garden and the Water Garden. Housing an office of the Eniwa Tourist Association, the rest area also offers Eniwa tourist information. Facilities also include a shop selling local specialties, a restaurant featuring dishes cooked with locally produced ingredients and a bakery popular for its handmade bread. A direct-sales outlet selling flower seedlings and seasonal farm produce is also popular with tourists. The vast parking lot is also used as an event venue.

Eniwa Farmers' Market "Kanona"

Situated in the Hana Road Eniwa roadside rest area, this farmers' market boasts some of the highest sales among farmers' markets in Hokkaido. It sells local specialties (including Ebisu pumpkins) and other high-quality seasonal foods at affordable prices, and is also popular for its wide selection of flower and vegetable seedlings. The popularity of the facility has spread by word of mouth, attracting not just the owners of local restaurants, but also many visitors from Sapporo. In fact, products there flow off the shelves as soon as the market is open.

Ecorin Village is a theme park highlighting the relationship between people and the natural environment. It's a great place to see flowers, come in contact with animals, and experience ecological lifestyles.



Ecorin Village Galaxy 'Ginga' Garden

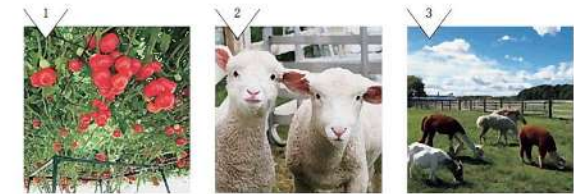
See animals and gardens that serve as a good gardening model

Crocuses start to bloom across Ecorin Village in early April, ushering in spring. The 10-hectare Galaxy 'Ginga' Garden there with small hills, ponds and 30 themed gardens is a great source of ideas for gardeners. As many as 1,000 kinds of flowers take turns blooming each season, and the balance of their colors and heights as well as objets d'art made from scrap wood and some devices to enhance visitor expectations give visitors something new no matter how often they visit. Ecorin Village is particularly popular from late June to mid-July, when roses are at their best: 500 roses

70 varieties in all - bloom in the rose garden, and 5,000 roses representing 100 varieties blossom in the entire village.

Another feature of this theme park is 'Midori no Makiba' Animal Farm where visitors can see animals like alpacas,

goats, and horses as well as sheep grazing on land. The farm offers the opportunity to see up close a sheep race, a sheep dog show in which a sheep dog moves sheep from one location to another, and a farm tour on a trailer powered by used cooking oil. Visitors can have a great time while thinking about their connections with plants/animals, the natural environment and ecology. The more time visitors spend at Ecorin Village, the more they engage in an ecological lifestyle because of the ecological loop the village forms by using the livestock grown there as ingredients for dishes served at the restaurants there and utilizing food waste from those restaurants and livestock manure as organic fertilizers.

Support for creating unique gardens 'Hana no Makiba' Garden Center

The garden center offers an extensive variety of seasonal plants, including herbs and perennial plants directly imported from Holland and over 650 varieties of roses, as well as a wide selection of gardening supplies, garden ornaments and furniture. It also hosts herb classes taught by a herb researcher and rose classes by a gardener from Galaxy 'Ginga' Garden. Gardening workshops, including vegetable classes by a soilmeister, are also offered on a regular basis.

Eniwa has more gourmet spots than many people would imagine, including a pizza restaurant serving genuine Neapolitan pizza and an eatery with a chef who honed his skills at a top-rated French restaurant.

Farmers in Eniwa – popular with Sapporo chefs

A glance at farm products on sale at Eniwa Farmers' Market "Kanona" will remind you what an incredible variety of vegetables are grown in the city. An increasing number of farmers are trying their hand at organic farming to ensure the safety and reliability of their produce, and the number of young people aspiring to enter farming is increasing.

Many chefs in Sapporo – a city of restaurants – acknowledge the quality of farm products in Eniwa. Having a contract farmer at a location only 40 minutes by car from Sapporo is just as good as stocking fresh vegetables in their backyard.

Eniwa is home to many well-known restaurants, ranging from Japanese to Western cuisines, thanks to the availability of delicious farm produce grown in the fields made fertile by subsoil water from Lake Shikotsu.

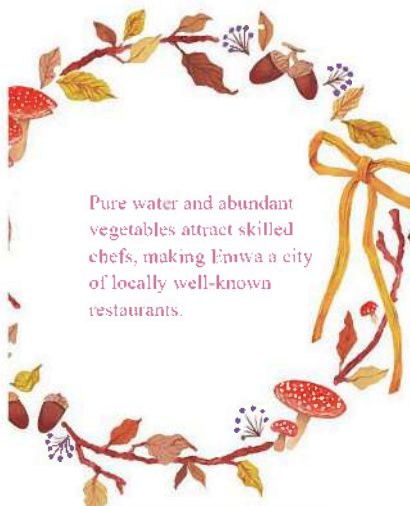

Beautiful forest and valley that would make you feel the urge to take photos

The Eniwa Valley is covered by a virgin forest consisting of Japanese oak, daimyo oak, and Yezo spruce, which was valued in the Edo period (1603–1868). Walk upstream along the bank of the Izari River, and you will find beautiful natural scenery and tranquility with little known local history.



Eniwa Valley



Mystery and romance as well as waterfalls with distinct features and charm

A walk upstream along the bank of the Izari River will take you to Lake Eniwa. Standing along the lake are Sakura Park, a popular cherry blossom viewing site in spring, and Jiyu Hiroba (Freedom Square), a great location for a BBQ. Going farther upstream, you will see three waterfalls along the Rarumanai River, where from the season of fresh green leaves to summer you can enjoy a refreshing atmosphere with the spray of water and sunshine filtered through foliage. The area, covered by a virgin forest, is also a popular spot for viewing the colorful foliage of Japanese elm, ginkgo, Japanese oak, maple, white birch and other trees in autumn. During the Edo period (1603–1868), Yezo spruce trees, known for their beautiful wood grain, were cut down here and transported via the Izari River to the mouth of the Ishikari River, from where they were shipped to Edo (today's Tokyo) and Osaka. Before long, a railroad was built for log transportation, and the area thrived on forestry. The valley is also known for a legend regarding samurai warrior Yoshitsune Minamoto (who lived in the 1100s) and therefore has an air of mystery and romance.



Damming up the water from the Eniwa Valley to provide water for domestic use
Lake Eniwa (Izari River Dam)

This artificial lake, built due to the construction of the Izari River Dam, affords a refreshing sight with its deep-green backdrop reflected on the lake's surface. Just downstream of the dam is the Jiyu Hiroba (Freedom Square) characterized by a vast lawn with a BBQ area and an arbour. The cherry trees planted to mark the dam's completion have grown; a large number of locals enjoy viewing cherry blossoms in Sakura Park every spring.



A legend that hidden treasures are buried behind the fall
Sandan Fall

This three-tiered fall ("Sandán" in Japanese) is the first of the three waterfalls to appear if you drive from central Eniwa toward Sapporo and Lake Shikotsu. Situated in the Eniwa Valley area, inhabited by Dolly Varden trout and Japanese crayfish, the waterfall is a truly breathtaking sight as it cascades down tiers of rock formations with trees reflected on the surface of the water as if they were shadow pictures. A local legend goes that treasures of samurai warrior Yoshitsune Minamoto are buried behind the fall in a legendary swamp called Kuma-no-sawa.

Rarumanai Fall

Surrounded by the smell of moss, the waterfall has an atmosphere of a Japanese garden. The bridge across the fall provides amazing views of platy lava joints continuing up to the river bottom as well as the traces of a railroad, which give a glimpse into industry and nature in olden times. With a little luck, you may be able to sight a common kingfisher and a Chinese peacock butterfly.

Spectacular, lively sights of a waterfall
Hakusen Fall

With water splashing from a height of 15 meters over a width of 18 meters, Hakusen Fall resembles a spread white folding fan, as the name Hakusen suggests. The waterfall is popular for its seasonal views: raging torrents during the snow-melt period, mid-summer scenery with a refreshing atmosphere, colorful autumn leaves, and the tall icy in winter. Areas with clear streams and forests that give a sense of refreshment

Eniwa has many clear rivers, where water crowfoot (*Ranunculus nipponicus* var. *submerses*) blooms in early summer and salmon return in autumn.

Natural water stemming from Lake Shikotsu and Mt. Izaridake

The existence of many rivers has earned Eniwa the name "a city of rivers." Crisscrossing the city are the Izari, Moizari, Kashiwagi, Shimamatsu, Yukanboshi and Rurumappu rivers, which all flow into the Chitose River and then into the Ishikari River before finally flowing into the Sea of Japan. These streams stem from snowmelt on Mt. Izaridake or Mt. Shimamatsu, which extend to the west of the city, and from subsol water of Lake Shikotsu. The areas near these streams attracted settlers in Hokkaido's pioneering days, leading to the development of forestry, agriculture and livestock farming.

City of water and greenery



Many forefathers engaged in business by taking advantage of the rivers and clear natural water from them, such as brewing local sake and producing fermented bean paste (miso), soy sauce and soft drinks as well as running a waterwheel-powered woodworking plant. Today, the city has many beverage and food processing plants, which is clear evidence of the high water quality. In rivers running in the area's urban areas, the blooming of water crowfoot (*Ranunculus nipponicus* var. *submerses*), which grows only in limpid streams, and the upstream migration and spawning of salmon create exquisite sights unique to Eniwa.



Lots of play equipment for children Midori-no-Furusato Forest Park

This forest park, situated on rolling terrain, has four separate forest areas with different themes and suitable environments and facilities: Fureai Forest, where visitors can sight Hokkaido squirrels and wild birds like black woodpeckers and great spotted woodpeckers; Ikigai Forest, where visitors can experience silviculture and learn how to grow mushrooms and fruits; Yorokobi Forest, where visitors can enjoy a walk along an approximately eight-kilometer-long trail while appreciating the natural surroundings; and Itoi Forest, where 14 Shinrin Torimyu adventure courses are available.

Flowers of water crowfoot, often called an "aquatic fairy" Moizari River and the Seseragi Waterway

The Moizari River was reborn thanks to a Hometown River Improvement Project, under which soil and stones were carried in onto the riverbed and willows were planted on the banks as part of greening and bank protection works. In the Seseragi Waterway developed by taking advantage of the river's meander, the dainty white flowers of water crowfoot, which grow only in limpid streams, are seen above the water in early summer.

Karinba site

Surprising discovery of the remains of graves from 3,000 years ago

A large number of archaeological finds have been unearthed at approximately 120 archaeological sites concentrated in the city's river basins. These include stone implements from about 7,000 years ago as well as dwelling remains, ornaments and tools from the Jomon period, which began in approximately 15,000 years B. C.

The site that made the biggest headline among them was the Karinba site, situated near JR Eniwa Station in the basin of the former Karinba River, where everyday tools, ornaments and grave remains from around 3,000 years ago were unearthed. Some of these artifacts were collectively designated as a National Important Cultural Property in 2005.

Attracting particular attention at the Karinba site were

shared graves where two to more than five people are believed to have been buried per grave. There were traces showing that a powdered red iron oxide, known as Bengala, was sprinkled at the graves and that bodies were buried with the legs and arms bent. The Karinba site yielded an extremely large number of funerary objects, including ornaments worn by those in the graves, as well as 108 lacquered combs - the largest number of such combs ever unearthed in Japan. Other finds include lacquered bracelets, sashes, other ornaments, red pigments blended into lacquer, and quern stones used to crush the minerals to make the pigments, suggesting the possibility that lacquer items were produced in this area.



Learn the little-known history of Eniwa Eniwa City Historical Museum

This museum showcases the replica of a shared grave excavated at the Karinba site as well as other finds, including pottery, stone implements and gems. Exhibits including artifacts from the Jomon, Epi-Jomon, Satsumon and Ainu culture periods as well as farming tools and everyday implements from Hokkaido's pioneering days highlight the history and culture of Eniwa. The museum also offers hands-on opportunities to make combs (the type consisting of separate teeth bound together), Jomon-style pottery and stone implements as well as workshops on local studies.

Karinba Nature Park

Karinba Nature Park is situated near the Karinba site (a national historic site) about one kilometer to the north of JR Eniwa Station. Part of the Karinba River reclaimed during Hokkaido's pioneering days has been restored, and a raised walking trail is available to enjoy the clear water in a forest. Known as a habitat of skunk cabbages, the park sees its water areas decorated with white flowers every spring. It is a relatively little-known scenic spot attracting not only locals, but also hikers from Sapporo and other neighboring cities.

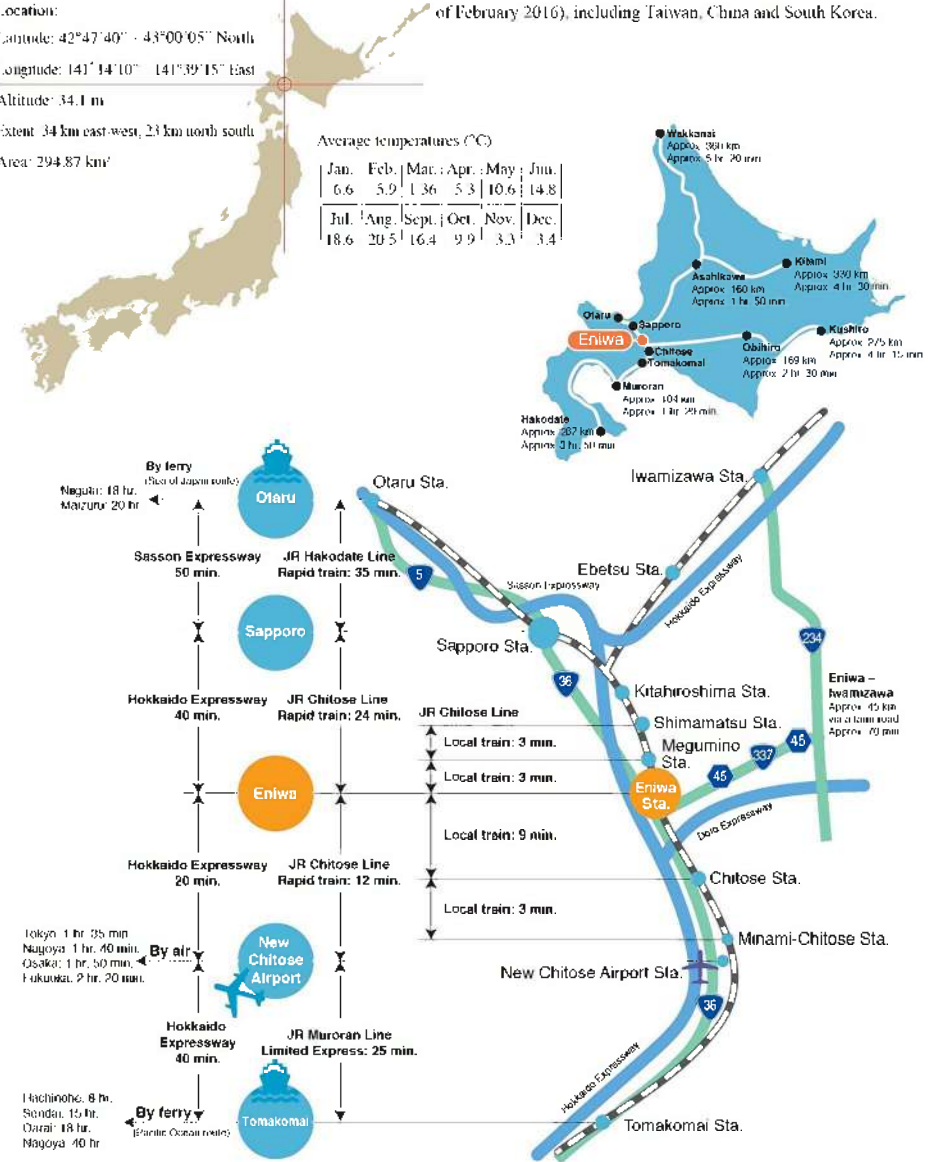

Eniwa is situated just 15 kilometers in straight-line distance from New Chitose Airport, billed as the air gateway to Hokkaido, and only a 12-minute rapid-train ride from the airport. This means that it takes only about two hours to travel to Eniwa if you fly from Tokyo, Nagoya or Osaka. New Chitose Airport is served by 13 international routes (as of February 2016), including Taiwan, China and South Korea.
